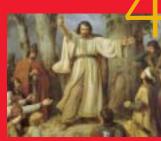

SULLIVAN Overtura di ballo (1870) • **BRIDGE** Isabella (1907) **ELGAR** Sea Pictures (1899) • **STANFORD** Symphony No. 3, "Irish" (1887)

Every note echoes their Victorian age – music that moved an entire kingdom. An overture by Sir Arthur Sullivan, independent of the words of W.S. Gilbert. The "Irish" Symphony, the masterpiece of Charles Stanford. Sir Edward Elgar is represented by his exquisite *Sea Pictures*. Music from the melancholy twilight of their era.



Sunday, June 6, 2004 – 3:00pm SPIRITUAL ROMANTICISM

MENDELSSOHN Lauda Sion (1846) • **WAGNER** Das Liebesmahl der Apostel (1843) **LISZT** Missa solemnis (1856)

Sacred, spiritual statements that sigh and thunder, whisper and roar. Contemporary with his towering *Elijah*, Mendelssohn's *Lauda Sion* is built on a more intimate scale. Liszt's majestic *Missa solemnis* is balanced by Wagner's *Love-Feast of the Apostles*, music that anticipates *Parsifal* by almost 40 years.

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
